





The Advent & Christmas Season

Advent is a season of expectation and preparation, as we prepare to celebrate the coming (adventus) of Christ in his incarnation, and also look ahead to his final advent as judge at the end of time. Church decorations are simple and spare, and purple is the traditional liturgical colour. Advent falls at the darkest time of the year, and the natural symbols of darkness and light are powerfully at work throughout Advent and Christmas.

The Moravian custom of Christingle has been revived in recent years with the encouragement of the Children's Society, and our service takes place on 8th December. The Third Sunday of Advent was observed in medieval times as a splash of colour in the restrained atmosphere



of Advent (*Gaudete* or 'Rose Sunday, and the last days of Advent were marked by the sequence of Great 'O' Antiphons, which continue to inspire modern Advent hymns and meditations.

The celebration of Christ's incarnation at Christmas is, with Easter, one of the two central points of the Christian year. We wonder at the mystery of God's dwelling among us in the fullness of humanity, foretold by the prophets and born of Mary. Christmas is however much more than simply the celebration of Jesus' birth, as we are reminded, amid the celebrations, of the profound truth of the Word made flesh. In the complex times we face, this deeper understanding provides comfort alongside the joy of the season.

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The Christmas crib service which we celebrate on Christmas Eve afternoon originated with St Francis of Assisi in the 13th century. Christmas carols were a medieval tradition, notably developed from the end of the nineteenth century. We have an informal Carol service in the church garden at 6pm on the 19th December and a traditional service of Lessons and Carols on 22nd December.

The Christmas season is often celebrated for twelve days, ending with the story of the wise men visiting Jesus at the Epiphany. However we continue to celebrate in other ways until Candlemas on 2nd February. We remember St Stephen (26th), the first Christian martyr, St John (27th), and the Holy Innocents (28th), drawing our attention to the plight of so many children who suffer in our world just as those who suffered at the hand of Herod as he sought to murder Jesus as an infant.

In January we also remember the conversion of St Paul, the crucial moment leading to him being the apostle to the non-Jewish world. Finally between 18th-25th January we celebrate the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, as we come together with fellow Christians here in Barnes and around the world, remembering Jesus' call for us to be united in him.






